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CARM Toronto Chapter - What are you working on?

Hello everyone:

October, November, and December were again very busy months for CARM Toronto Chapter members. Since the last letter was issued I've received some wonderful emails from CARM members to include in this issue of "what are you working on?". I have also enjoyed speaking to many of you at the CARM layout tours, dinners, and at the hobby shops – and this month's letter show just how varied what everyone is working on can be in this hobby including making kits, setting up shipping schedules for operating sessions, producing post operation reports, event attendance, and even coming soon stand-ins! It's the end of the year, nearly New Year's Eve, so grab some tea or coffee and enjoy reading about what some members have been doing over the last couple of months.

1. Gerald Harper's New On3 Flat Car Build: Gerald Harper has been working on a new rolling stock kit flat car, as shown below. Gerald notes:



I attach a photo of an On3 18ft 6in flat car I have just built from a kit of Mount Blue Models. It still needs a bit of finishing like staining the deck and tie downs for the load of copper ingots. The copper ingots have a core of lead so the overall load adds a nice amount of weight to an otherwise very light car. The trucks presently installed on it are also too long and I have a shorter pair on order. Overall though I



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am quite pleased with the result. Mount Blue makes nice kits – mostly laser cut wood parts. This car will be running on my new, under construction modular portable layout depicting the Anyox Mine Railway in the 1920s in On3 scale as the actual line was a 3 ft gauge system.

3. Ian McIntosh's How I Spent My Summer, Fall And Early Winter: Ian sent in a summary of what he has been up to from Summer to early Winter and I myself look

On the long weekend of August I went to the CARM Montreal Meet, had a great time and took a lot of pictures. I'll be showing some of those at the Toronto Chapter meeting January 16th. One is in the CARM calendar (September). BTW, the June calendar photo is from Ian McIntosh in Regina, not me. In November and December I helped operate the Scarborough Model Railroaders HO layout during their open houses, and I'll be doing that again in February and March. I'm reading "Train" by Tom Zoellner, about 7 railways around the world that the author travelled on, with interesting details of history and people. And I've been preparing the 2018 Model Train and Train Events web page, which always takes more time than I expect.

4. Willie Waithe's CN Weston Sub Shipping Routes and Schedules: Willie's new layout continues to progress with scenery, buildings, etc, all coming into place and trial operation sessions running to test the layout. He writes:

I am working on refining the shipping train routes and schedules used in operating sessions on the CN Weston sub. Ship It, for those who are not familiar with it, is a software program for directing the switching moves in an operating session. We have nine industries served by rail on the layout. With Ship It, one enters the needs for each industry for empty cars for shipping goods (shippers) and the need for goods from the "outside world" (consignees). These data are based on research for the particular industry. In addition, the program determines the time needed to empty a load or to load a car.


Train routes and schedules are set up in another part of the program. One enters the route and times for each industry and the program generates train sheets (see photo).

Once the database is set and automatically adjusted by the program, the result is realistic switch lists which are not random or repetitive and which result in a dynamic movement of freight traffic to and from the industries. Upon testing an initial trial run, I realized that there is room for improving the traffic flow by adjusting the freight train



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schedules. That is what I am working on (among other things involved in rebuilding the layout).

5. James Rasor's CN Maintenance of Way Trackside Trio: When I first started working on William Waithe's CN Weston N Scale Layout I asked him if we could add some maintenance of way items and he said sure – well, of course this was heaven for me and I knew I was in the right place for sure! Pictured below is a collection of hard working CN trackside MoW vehicles that I have just finished for the layout over the holidays, including a Showcase Miniatures I Class MoW truck, a GHQ Road Master Series Bobcat, and a Railway Express Miniatures Swingmaster. The unassembled pieces in front of them is a second Swingmaster kit to kind of show a before-and-after look of for these neat little vehicle kits. The Swingmaster's cab is a solid piece of soft metal without open windows and it is always interesting to try and



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figure out how to paint the windows: black, silver, a mix of colours? Hmmmm? I used a little blue and black on this one and then brushed Micro Kristal Clear over them. Good enough for the N scale 36" rule?

I spent most of my time trouble shooting and observing.

CIE B188 diesel for use on Express passenger train service.

The bogie bolster on Gerry's breakdown train derailed on the crossings on several occasions and was taken out of service. The reworks to the bolster (see previous report) resulted in the axles not being quite parallel. Gerry has broken down and bought an Athern Tank car for replacement bogies J.

The Kadee coupling on Phil's Drummond is set to low and the trip pin fouled on the uncoupling ramp when moving in reverse in Windermere. The loco was kept in service but the coupling height should be adjusted, a toothpick might do it J..

The Kadee coupling came off Alan's recently acquired Maroon LMS Jinty. The loco was removed from service and replaced with a Jinty from my roster #3 set. In retrospect we should have used the Web Coal Tank as Mike brought his own morning shunter and the Web Coal Tank wasn't needed for shunting.



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Kadees weren't the only couplings in trouble, John's Class 33's tension-lock coupling was a little low and was sometimes a bit difficult to recouple, no major problem

Phil's South Western 4 coach EMU was a bit speedy for the mix. In a moment of distraction, the operator allowed it to run into the back of the long goods train, easily done. see snag report #2..

Brian's handsome Peckett lost one of its Kadee knuckle when the swivel pin fell out somewhere and was lost. A sausage voucher for anybody finding it J A new coupling was installed and the engine was returned to service.

Other than the above, all visiting stock ran well.
